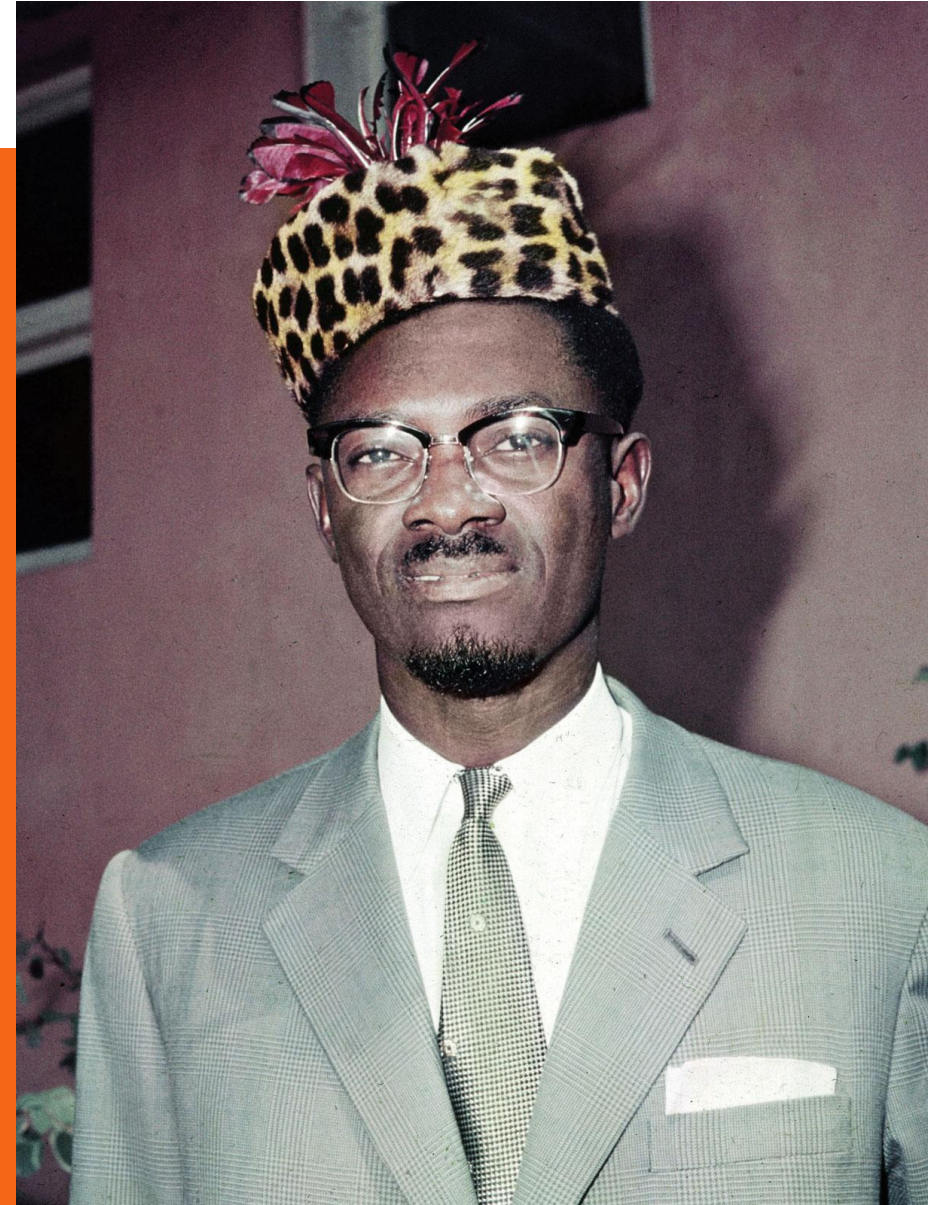

BLACK HISTORY MONTH – DAY 6: PATRICE LUMUMBA

- First legally elected prime minister of the Democratic Republic of Congo
- Assassinated in 1961 by the U.S. and Belgian governments (Both wanted control over the Congo region for raw materials).
- Lumumba's goal as prime minister was to give the Congo region complete independence and control to the people
- Wanted to improve living situations and spread national unity



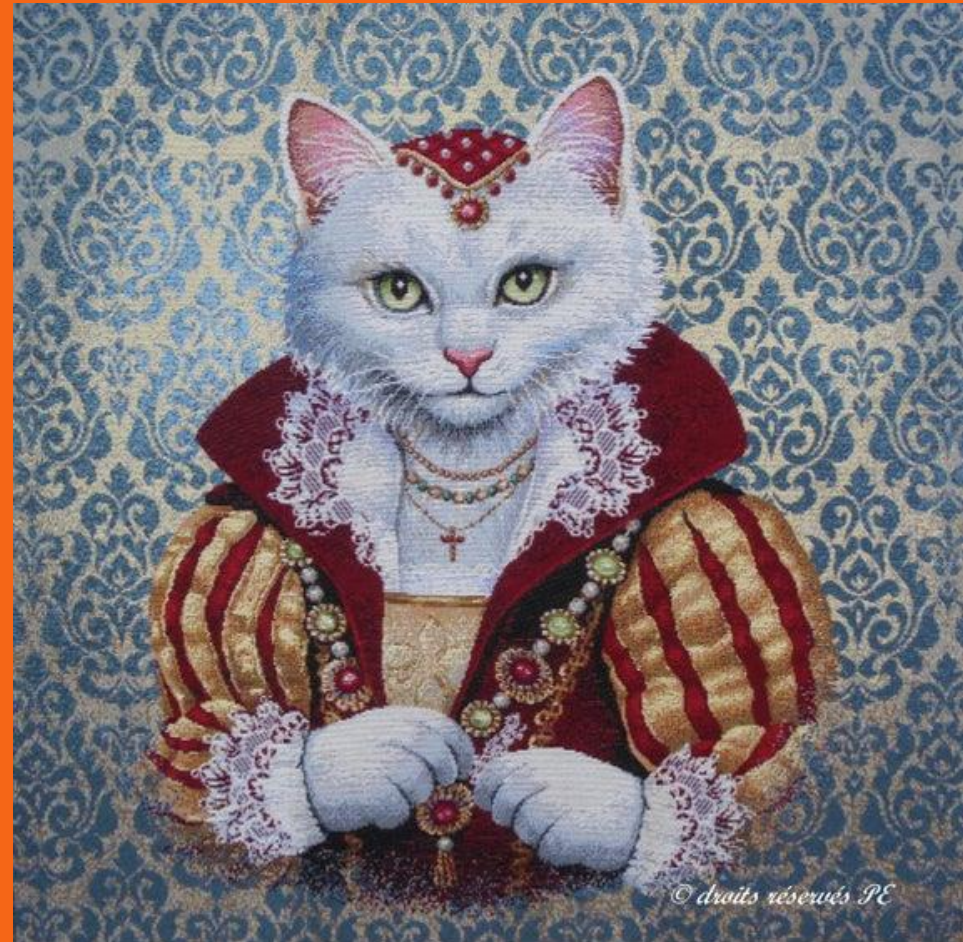

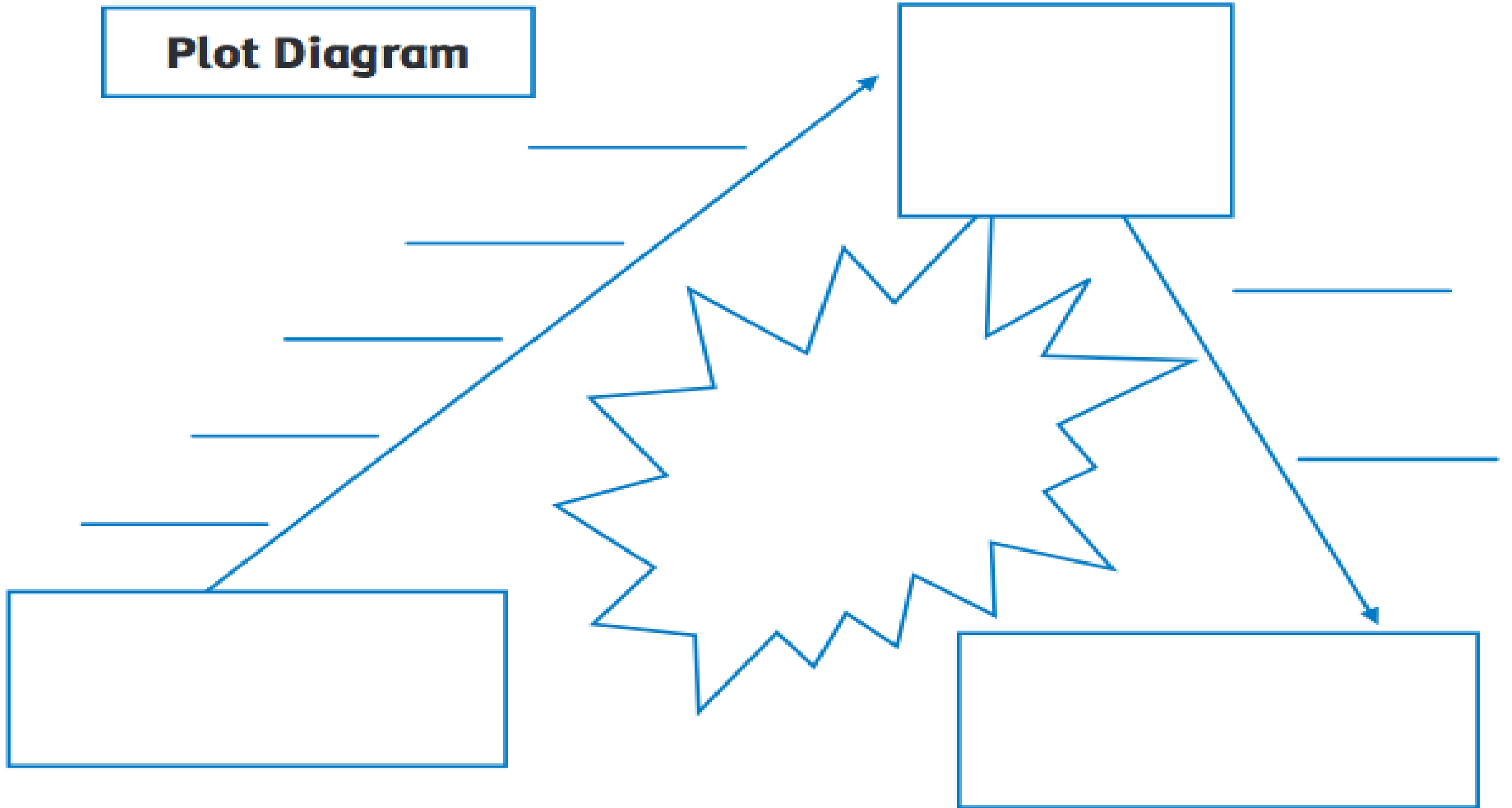


REVIEWING PLOT ELEMENTS

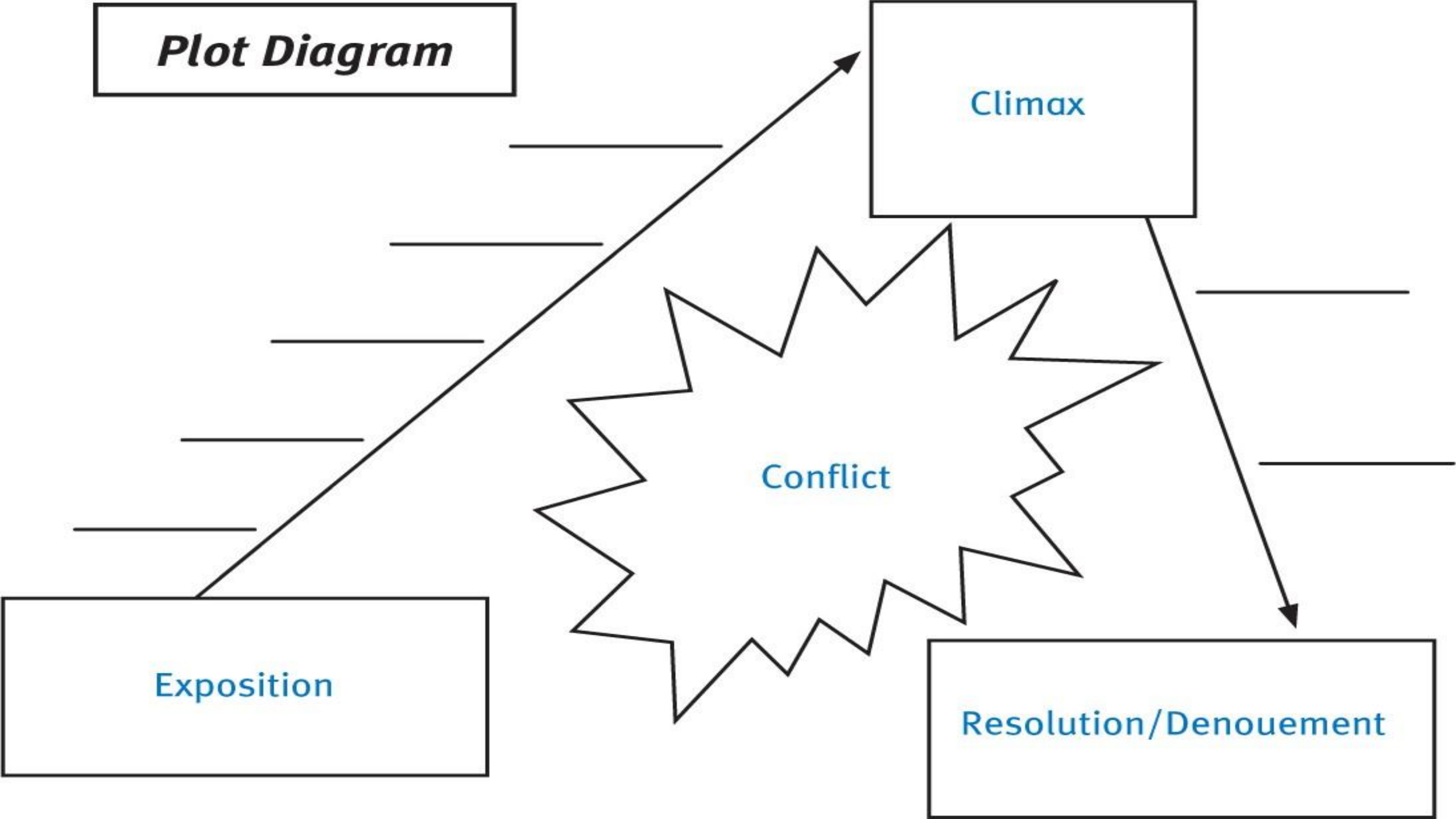

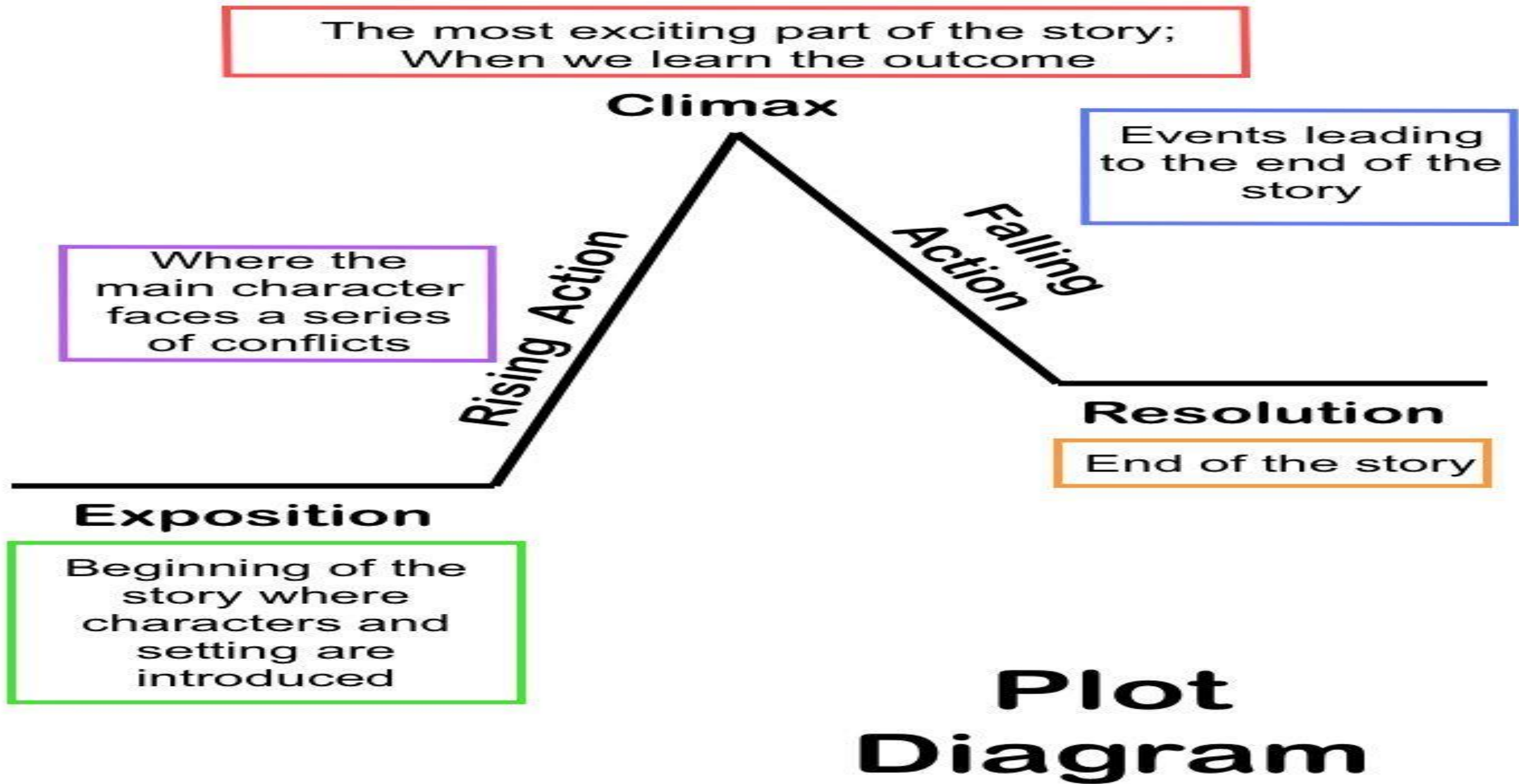


Plot Diagram

1ST PERSON

- I am so tired of school this time of year.

2ND PERSON

- You really sound like Squidward when **you're** mad.



3RD PERSON

- **They** love to play that dumb game called “Fortnite”.
- **Chris** and **Michelle** said that **Tom** has a square-shaped head.



3RD PERSON LIMITED VS. 3RD PERSON OMNISCIENT

- 3rd person omniscient: the narrator knows **EVERYTHING** about **EVERY** character (including thoughts, feelings, etc.); all-knowing narrator
- 3rd person limited: the narrator only knows everything about **ONE** character.

3RD PERSON OMNISCIENT

- *Lianna and Jose were both overcome with fear. Lianna worried that they would never escape the car. Jose feared that by smashing the window they would drown immediately. Both lovers proceeded to hold hands, close their eyes, and hope for the best.*

3RD PERSON LIMITED.

- *Trevor was curious about the girl sitting in front of him. He desperately wanted to get up and sniff her hair, but he knew this to be improper. She glanced at him. He was not sure if this was a look of annoyance, or a look of endearment. Her mystery gripped his mind for the rest of the day.*

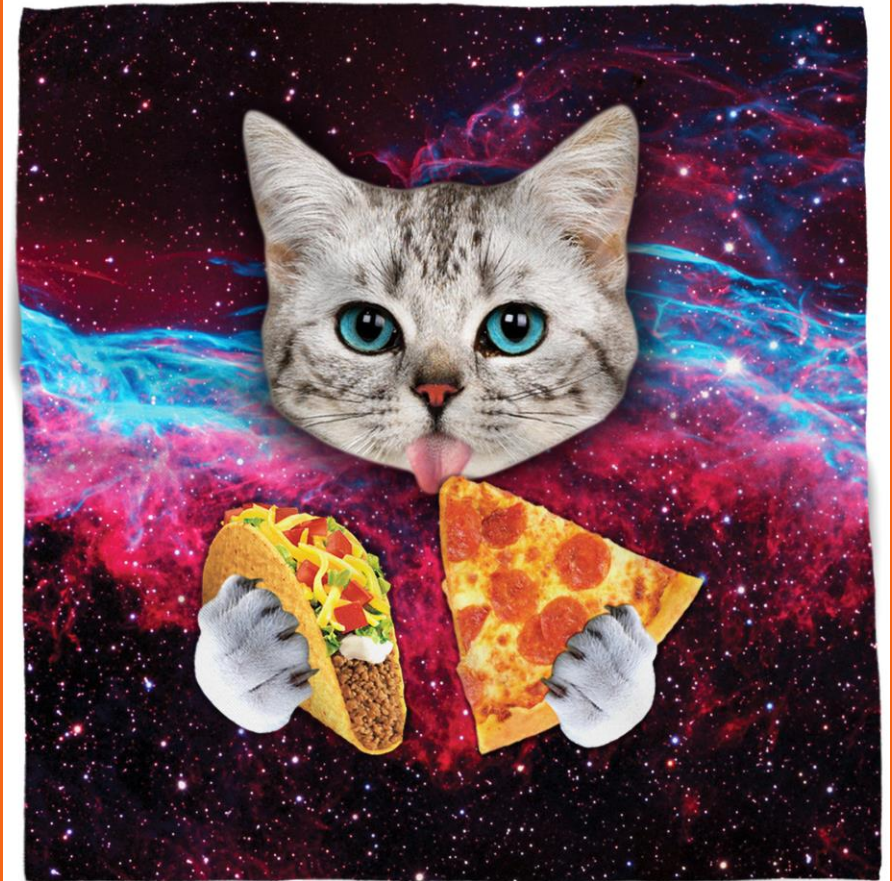

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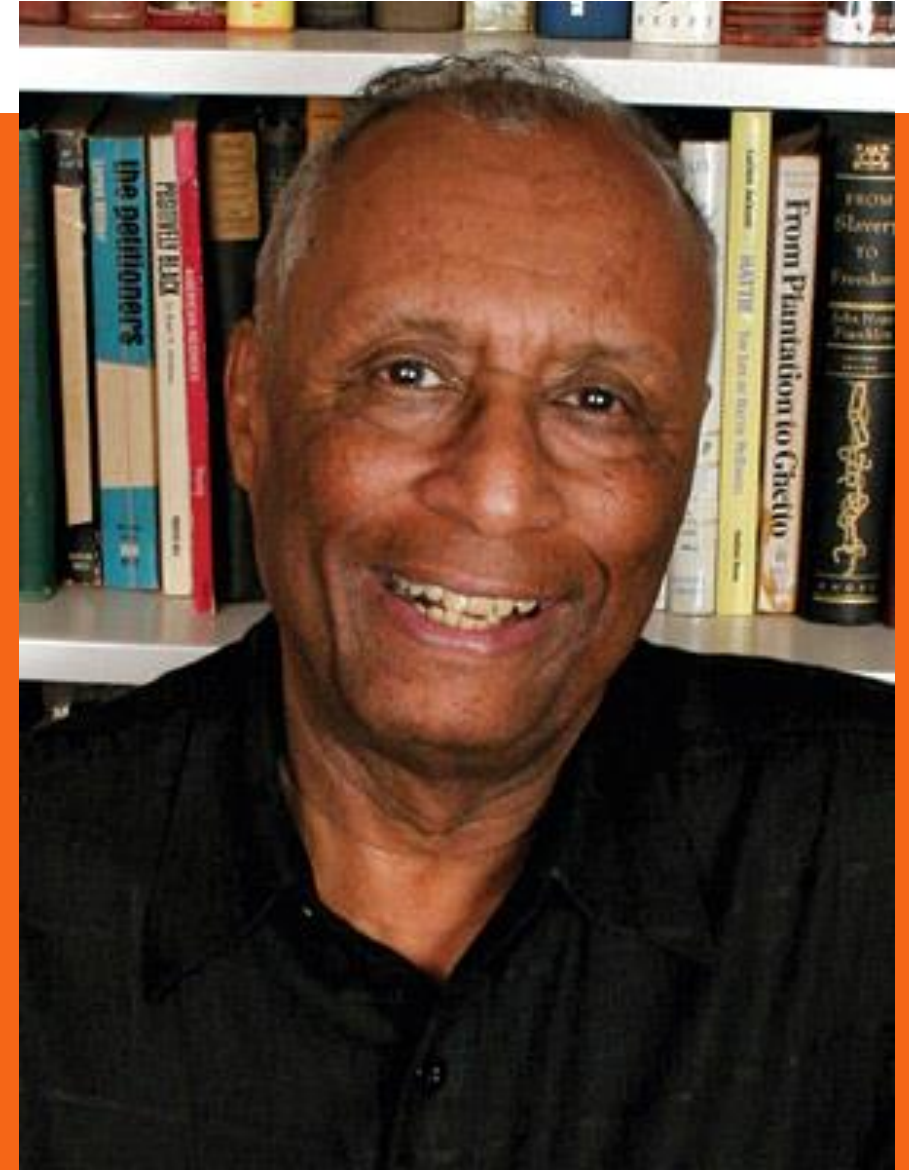

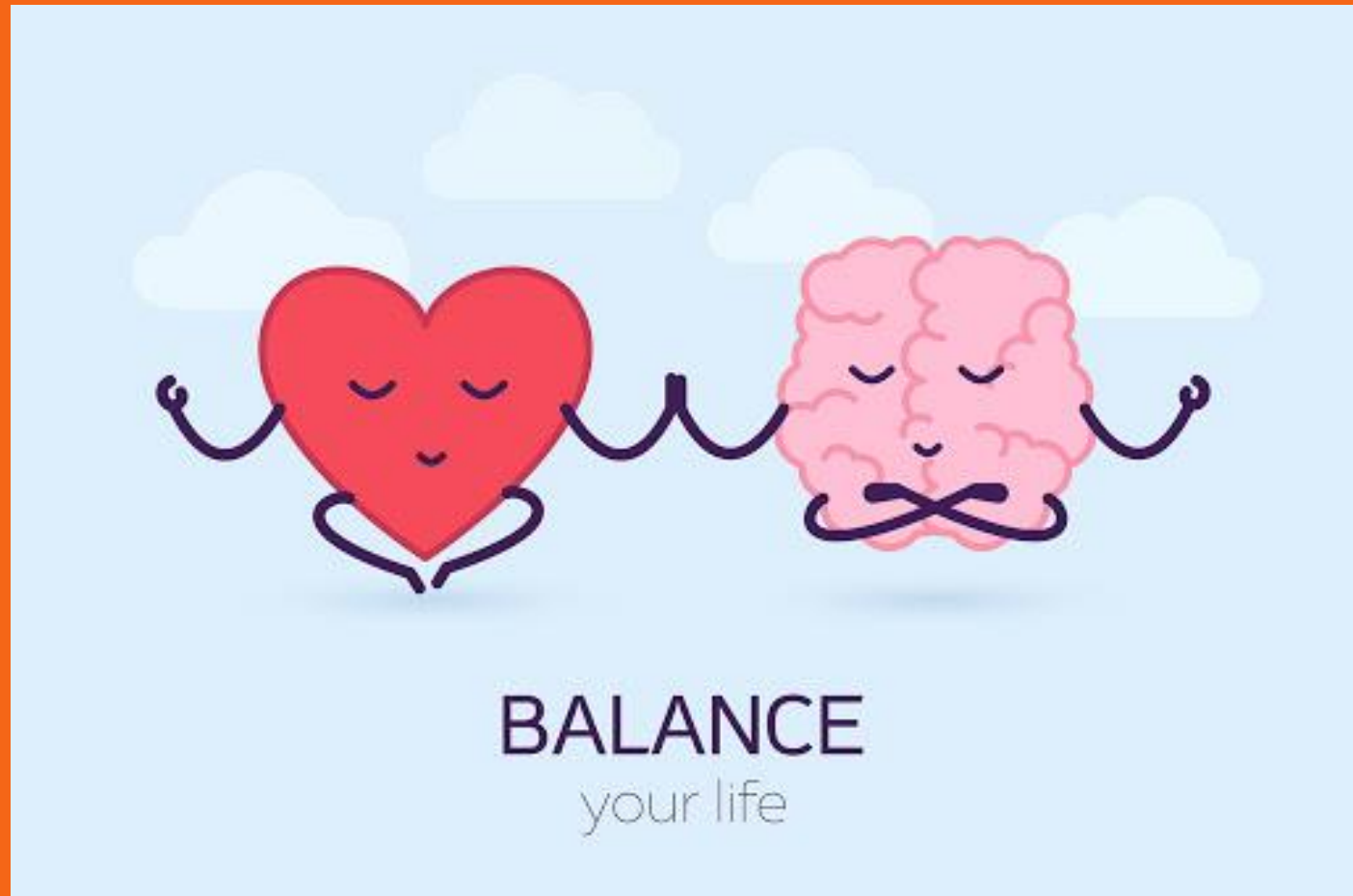
BLACK HISTORY MONTH – DAY 9: HENRY SAMPSON

- Received several awards for his contributions in atomic energy and aerospace engineering



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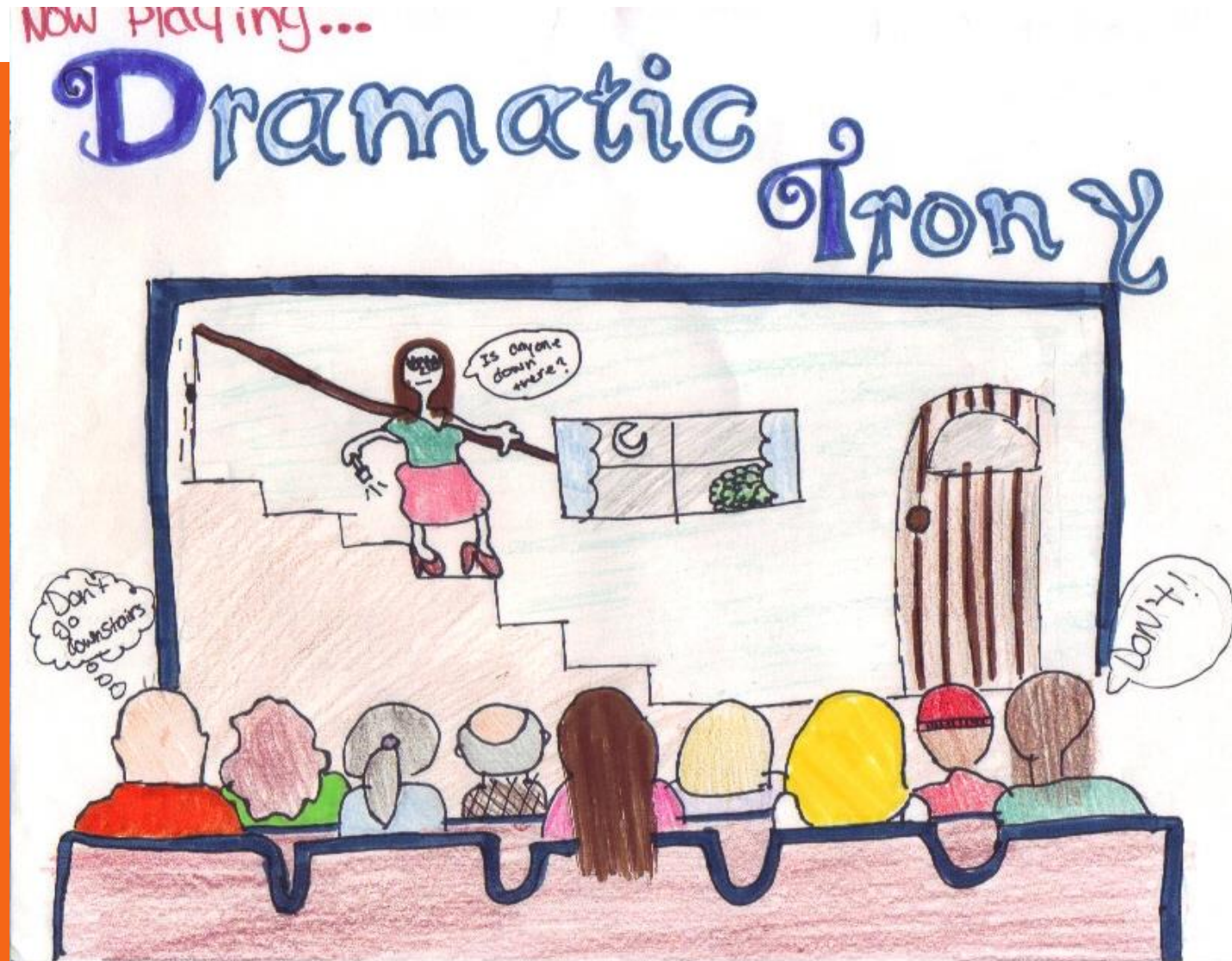
MARIGOLDS CONSTRUCTED RESPONSE NARRATIVE

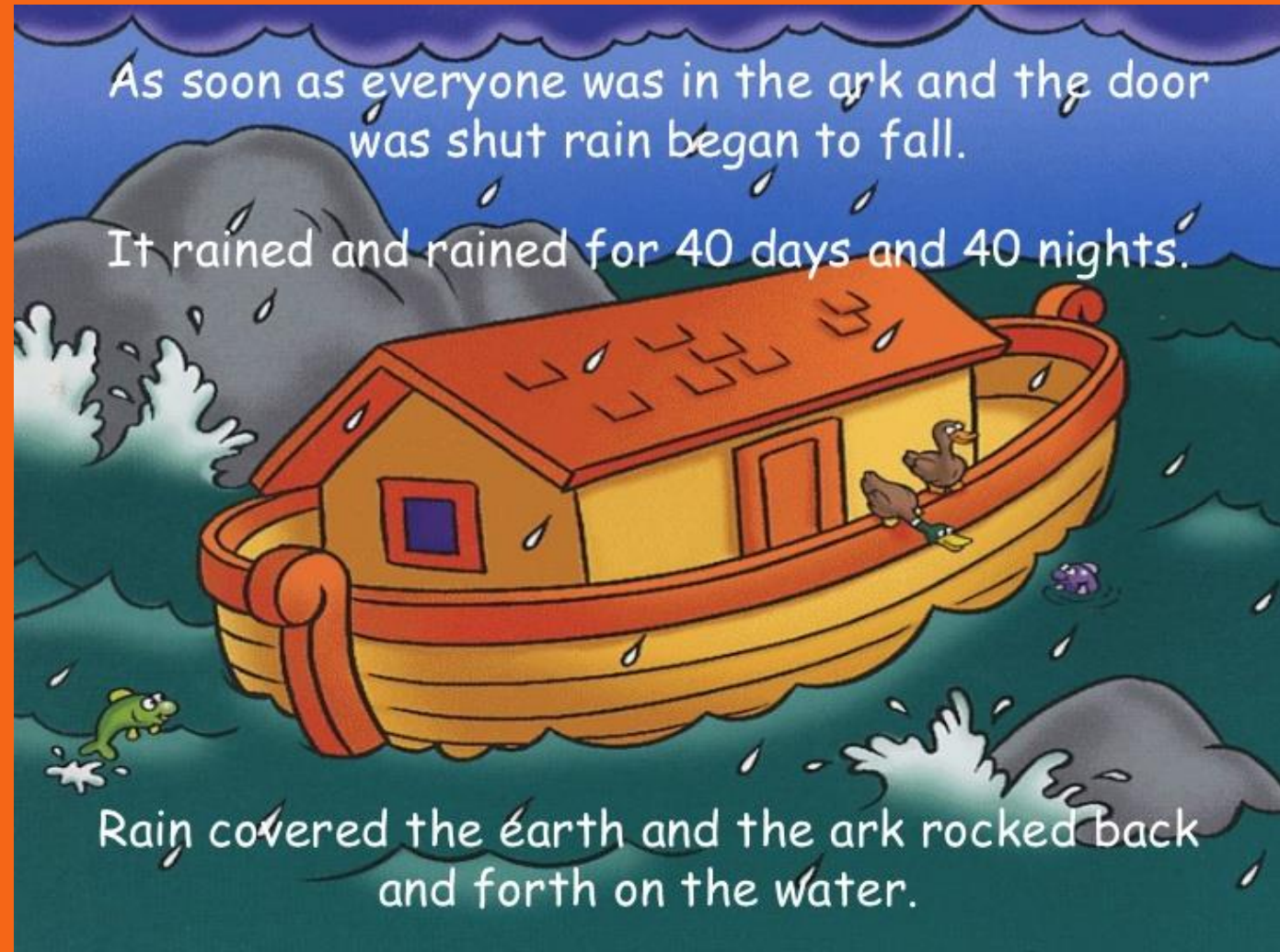


ALLUSION

- A reference made to a well-known person, event, or place from history, music, art, or another literary work.
- EX) I was surprised his nose was not growing **like Pinocchio's**.
- EX) He was a real **Romeo** with the ladies.
- EX) Jamie gave a **Barrack mic-drop** speech.
- EX) **Drake** texted **Kiki** and asked him **if she loves him**.

MOST COMMON FORM OF ALLUSION

- Biblical allusion is the most common form of allusion (references to The Bible).
- EX) It is raining so hard, I hope it doesn't rain for **40 days and 40 nights**. (Referencing the Biblical story of Noah's Arc).

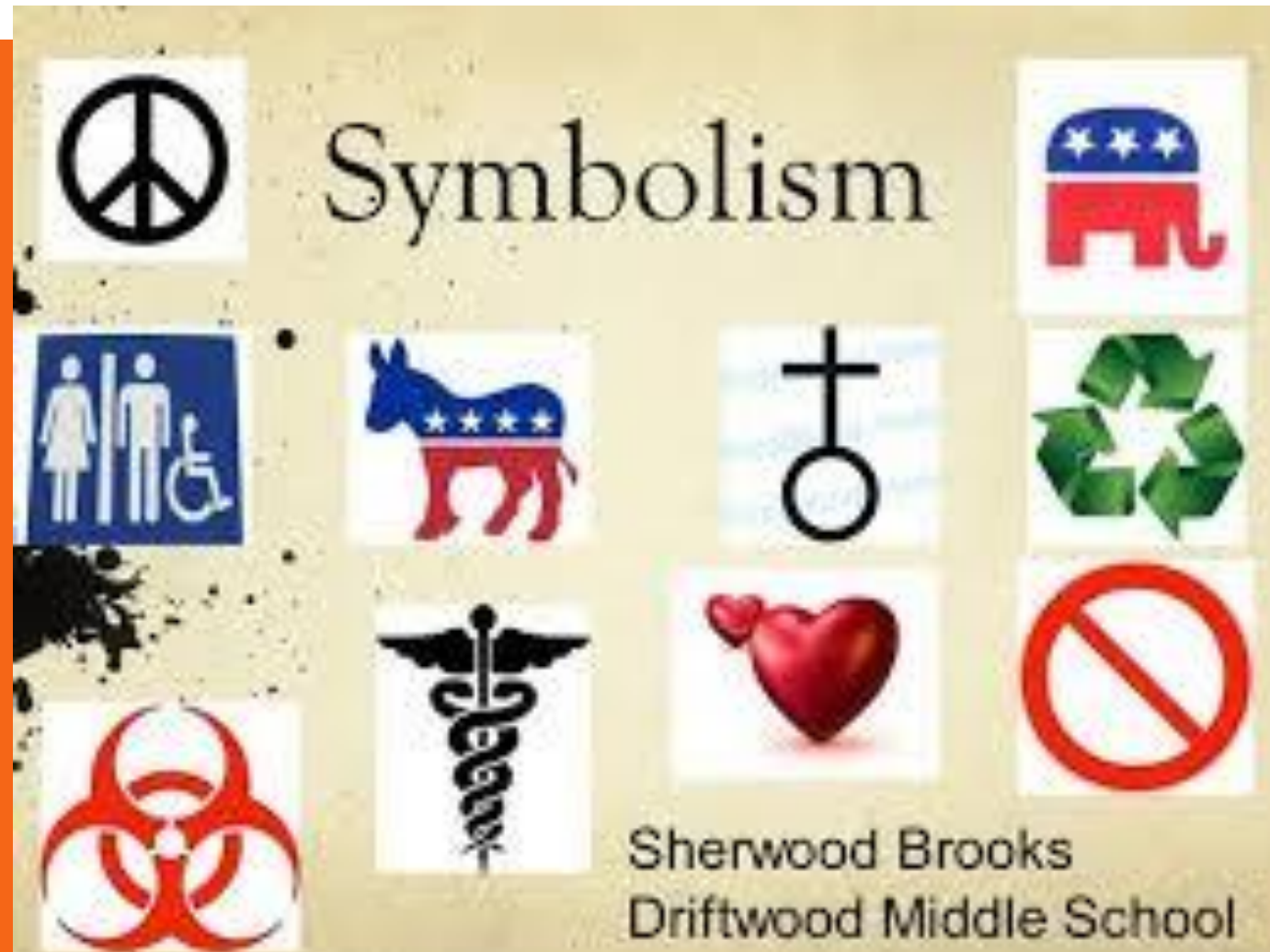

SYMBOLISM

- Anything (object, animal, event, person, or place) that represents itself but also stands for something else on a figurative level.
- *EX) Doves represent peace. Anytime we see a dove in literature, we can assume it symbolizes peace.*

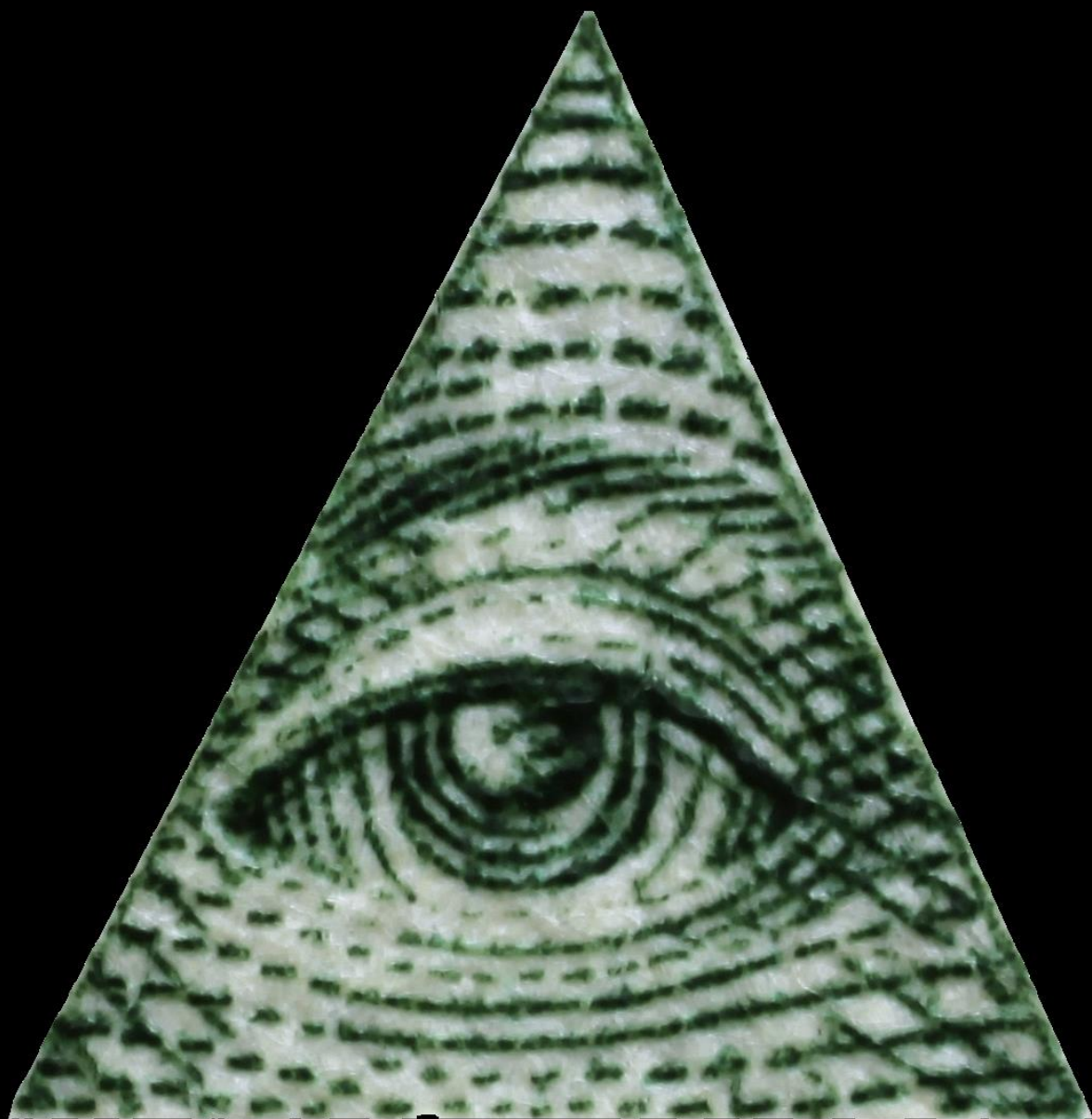

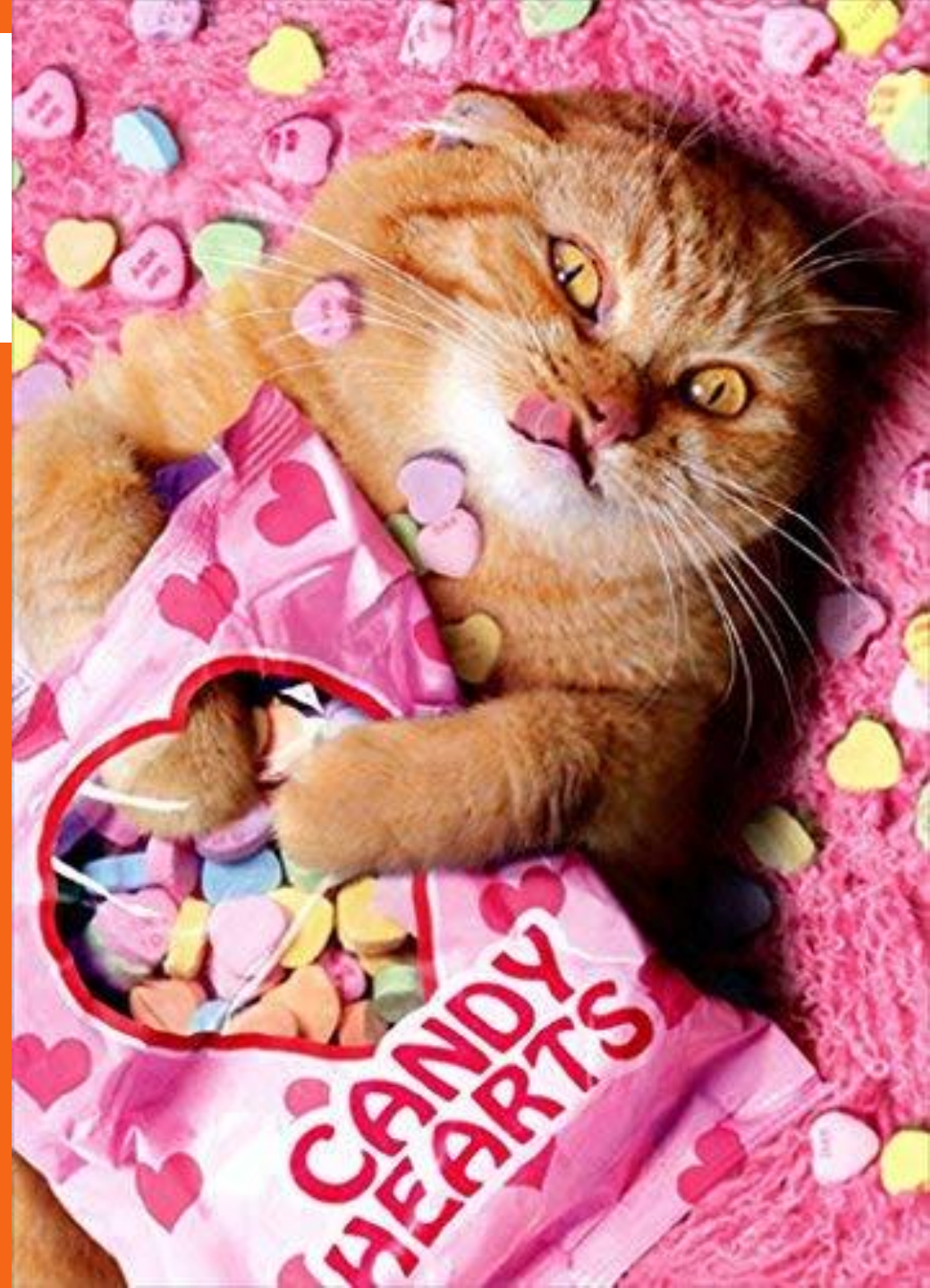
- Creepy short story

- Faced segregation in school and while working for NASA



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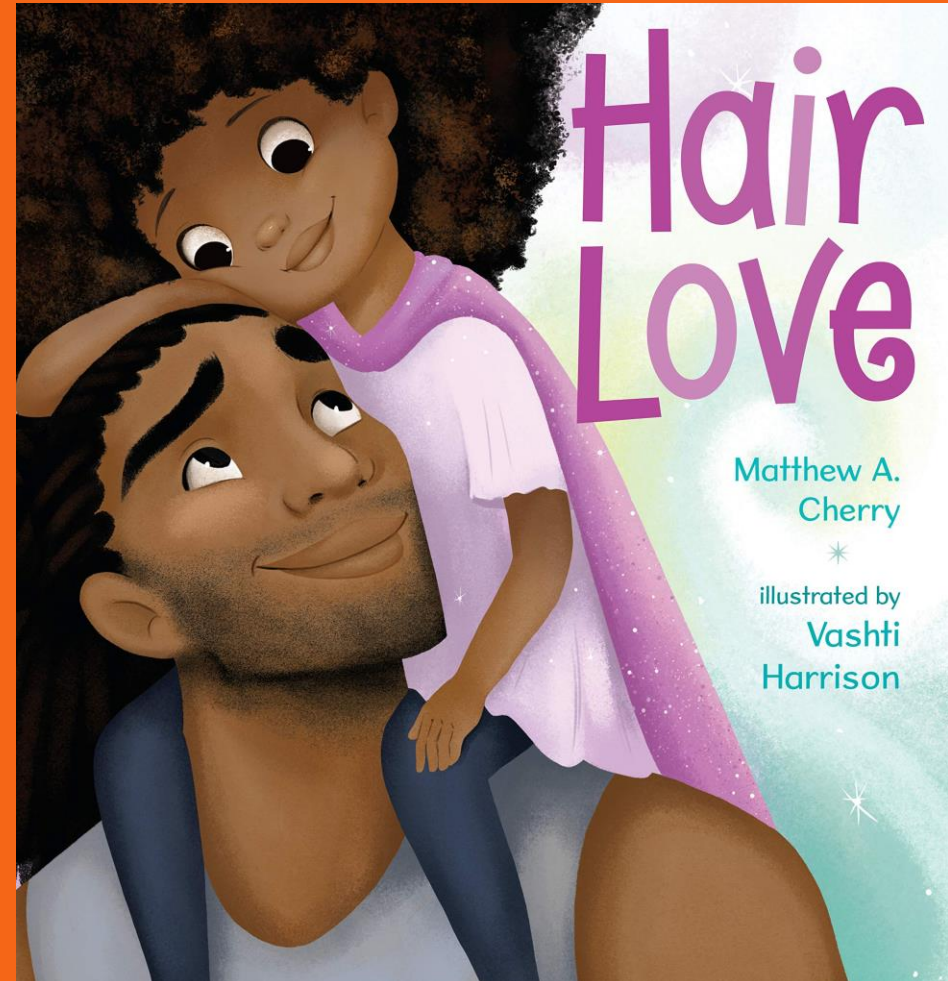
THEME
